 A Province is made up of Dioceses in general proximity. There are nine provinces within the Episcopal Church. The Diocese of Alabama resides in Province IV.

Province IV

Province IV is the largest of the Episcopal provinces, comprised of twenty dioceses in nine Southeastern states. This province is also called "the Province of Sewanee," after the School of Theology of the University of the South, located in Sewanee, Tennessee. Dioceses in this province include: Alabama, Atlanta, Central Florida, the Central Gulf Coast, East Carolina, East Tennessee, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Southeast Florida, Southwest Florida, Tennessee, Upper South Carolina, West Tennessee, Western North Carolina, and Lexington.

- A **Diocese** is a number of congregations within a geographical area, under the jurisdiction of a Bishop.
- A **Convocation (or Deaneries)** represent a number of Parishes in a general geographical area, meeting and working together. The Diocese of Alabama has seven Convocations.
- A **Parish** is a community of people who worship and work together. A Parish is generally self-supporting.
- **General Convention** is held every three years to decide the general program for the Church. The legislative body is composed of two houses: House of Bishops (all Bishops active or retired) and House of Deputies (four clergy and four lay leaders elected by each Diocese and jurisdiction). The 41 member Executive Council carries out Church policy and meets quarterly between Conventions. The 193rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama will be held in Montgomery on Feb. 8-10, 2024 at the Renaissance Hotel in downtown Montgomery

ECW Triennial is the meeting of the Episcopal Church Women held concurrently with General Convention every three years. Province IV meetings are held the first week in June each year. The 51st ECW Triennial will be held in Louisville, Kentucky on June 20th-28th, 2024.

- From 1874-1958, the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions of the Episcopal Church served women's ministries. The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) was founded in 1958. Episcopal Church Women are all ages, ethnic origins and socio-economic backgrounds with the common denominators being our love of God and the wish to do His work. The Mission is to empower women to do Christ's ministry in the world with the Vision that we become a vibrant blend of all ages, coming together as a peacemaking, healing part of the Church.
- During Triennial, United Thank Offering (UTO) grants are announced, leadership training is available and national church issues discussed. The national ECW website can be found at ecwnational.org.

SCHOLARSHIPS

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS have been given by ECW since before 1900 due to a request from Bishop Richard Hooker Wilmer to John Ward Noble to enable daughters of Diocesan clergy to attend the Noble Institute, a school for girls. Since that time other funds have been established by Edith Buell Wilson, Isla Hall Hilderbrand, Elizabeth Blair Pannell, Sarah Sterrett Porter, Bishop Onell Soto and St. Johns, Ensley. Some funds have restrictions in addition to the policies of the ECW Board and Scholarship Committee. These funds are derived from the Diocesan and Parish ECW budgets, memorials, alms and gifts. In 2008, we also made available the **WOMEN AT THE WELL SCHOLARSHIP** to lay and clergy for spiritual refreshment with each recipient able to receive up to \$400.

All scholarships are based on 40% need, 40% church involvement and 20% merit. Applicants must be communicants of the Diocese of Alabama and must provide document information regarding family's financial status (IRS 1040 form). Application must be made each year a student is in college with awards limited to a maximum of two years. Granted **funds are mailed directly to the registrar's office** of the college. Since Seminarians receive CPC funds, they are ineligible for ECW scholarships. **Applications** must be **accompanied by a transcript, photograph, and a Church Involvement Survey** completed by the Parish Priest (or Senior Warden, if no Priest). **Incomplete packages or those postmarked past the due date will not be considered.** If applying for a second scholarship, the College Chaplain's evaluation is acceptable. Important dates, applications, and involvement surveys are available on the www.alabamaecw.org website. Scholarships are awarded in June of each year.







The Mission of the UNITED THANK OFFERING (UTO) has remained constant: thankful offerings given for the everyday blessings of life to provide blessings for others. Individuals in each Parish take part spiritually by offering prayers of thanksgiving and by actively dropping coins in the "Little Blue Box." These coins gathered at each church are united with others from all over the country. All UTO Ingathering money is used to award grants. Over the past 131 years, the United Thank Offering has collected and granted over \$140 million dollars.

UTO Ingathering should take place twice a year in each Parish at a time arranged with the Rector and publicized several weeks prior. Please contact the Diocesan UTO Coordinator if you are interested in applying for a grant. **Dates and times for grant submission will be posted on the website.** All grants will be screened by the Diocesan UTO Committee. The committee selects the grant which best fits the Mark of Mission as designated by the National UTO Committee. The UTO Committee meets each year to determine grants to be sent to the Bishop and the National UTO office.

The UTO Alms Basin created by the women of the Diocese of Alabama can be used by any Parish during a UTO Ingathering. Please contact the Cathedral Church of the Advent, Birmingham to use the basin.
